In the rod/reel category, the first place team was Dustan Daniels and Doug Daniels, who brought in 17 carp. The second place team was Barry Madden and BJ Tallent and the third place team was Sam Schmidt and Danny Williams.

HANSEN MUSEUM

The 35th annual Logan Labor Day Celebration, sponsored by the Dane G. Hansen Memorial Museum and Dane G. Hansen Foundation, is planned for Sunday, Sept. 4, Highway 9, Logan Golf Course, Logan, with a full day of activities. There is no admission fee for this event.

The Logan Labor Day Celebration, begins at 8 a.m. with a Logan Chamber sponsored ecumenical church service, a remote fly-in, and at 9 a.m. sand volleyball tournament.

The Logan Chamber of Commerce food booth will open at 8 a.m. and the Sno-Cone Shack will begin serving at 10 a.m. Vehicles will roll in for the Dane G. Bales Junior Memorial Car Show which starts at 10 and ends at 4 p.m. The Van De Creek State Sanctioned Kid's Tractor Pull starts at 2 p.m. Children's entertainment during the day includes Speedway Tire Challenge, Log of Doom and Climb and Slide (9:30 a.m. - 5:30 p.m.), the RTS Express train (2-4 p.m.) and the Kansas Hunter's Education Instructor's Association Pellet Range (10 a.m - 4:30 p.m.). Scout groups will be conducting activities throughout the day for all children.

The Prairie Dusters Mounted Drill Team from the Logan area is offering horse rides beginning at 3 p.m. and at 4:30 p.m. They will demonstrate their precision drill routines. This is a popular group and will thrill the crowds with their costumes, horses and flag ceremonies.

Appearing on stage at 5:30 p.m. will be the "Jimmy

Dee and The Fabulous Destinations." This group of musicians from Victoria have a high energy show, featuring major hits from the early 1960s, that propelled the band into one of the most popular groups to ever perform in western Kansas. In 2002, Jimmy Dee released a CD entitled "Round Trip" and followed that with another CD in 2003 called "Summer Fun." Today, the group is still going strong, playing selected dates throughout the year.

At 7:30 p.m. "Night Wing," their music stretches from the Top 40 pop and country hits of today to popular rock-n-roll classics. Night Wing, the country/rock showcase group of the United States Air Force Heartland of America Band, inspires audiences to increase patriotism through their unique vocal blend and amazing musicianship while raising awareness of our expeditionary Airmen serving around the globe.

Following the evening entertainment, Rainbow Fireworks of Inman, will light up the sky with a fabulous display of fireworks, which can be seen for miles around the Logan Golf Course. All these activities and no admission fees.

Student News

The Trustees of the Thomas D. Morgan Trust have announced the recipients of the trust's interest free student loan program the 2011-12 school year.

The Trustees have selected Troy Bainter, Billy Broeckelman, Taylor Gordon, Diedre Kramer, Kaid McKenna, David Mizell, Jacob Mizell, Kelsie Morel and Kaylen Rossi to receive interest free loans.

The Trustees stressed that these applicants were all excellent applicants, who qualified under the trust guidelines set down by Mr. Morgan.

Troy will attend the University of Nebraska at Kearney majoring in construction management and will be on the wrestling team; Billy will attend Kansas State University majoring in computer science, with a minor in education; Taylor plans to attend Fort Hays State University majoring in computer science with an emphasis on business; Diedre plans to attend College of the Ozarks majoring in forestry science with a minor in photo journalism; Kaid will attend Hastings College and major in pre-engineering and agribusiness and has signed to play football; David plans to attend Fort Hays State University majoring in art, with a possible minor in business; Jacob will also be attending Fort Hays State University majoring in art with a minor in teaching and business; Kelsie will attend Kansas State University studying at the college of Human Ecology majoring in interior design with a minor in interior architecture; and Kaylen will be attending Kansas State University majoring in dietetics or human nutrition.

There are currently 19 students, including the above recipients, receiving interest free loans from the Thomas Morgan Trust for the 2011-12 school year. Also, any recipient of a Morgan Loan could be eligible for loan forgiveness of up to 50 percent if they return to the Norton County to work and live.

The interest free student loan program was arranged by Mr. Morgan during his lifetime, and is funded by a bequest from his estate. Under the loan program, any Norton Community High School graduate is eligible to apply for the loans set forth under the trust.

The loan program is designed to aid students

seeking higher education in accredited institutions, including but not limited to, colleges, universities, vocational technical schools, trade schools, business schools, and other institutions of higher education. Mr. Morgan expressly directed, in his trust, that any area of study in higher education was eligible, save for areas relating to medicine or law.

The trust agreement directs that an applicant must have participated in and successfully completed one extracurricular activity during each of his or her four years of high school, and the applicant must have had a grade point average of at least 3.0 on a 4.0 scale for five out of the preceding seven semesters. The Trustees were also directed to give consideration to participation by the applicant in extracurricular activities, church activities, community and civic affairs, morals and citizenship.

The loan proceeds may be used by the recipients for tuition, books and supplies, room and board and other approved expenses.

The Trustees want to stress to future potential applicants that the application forms and related forms for next year will be available on request from the trust at 785-877-5183 or PO Box 364, Norton, Kansas 67654, or from the Norton Community High School counselor's office.

Morgan was employed by the Kansas Department of Transportation, as an engineer, and was formerly mayor of the city of Norton.

Morgan was very interested in science and higher education, and was well aware of the positive effects of his own college education. Tom Morgan was committed to helping the youth of the city of Norton, and accordingly left the bulk of his estate in trust to be used in furthering higher education for graduates and former graduates of Norton Community High School.

The Trustees have the direction and authority to renew these loans for up to an additional three years, as well as making the ongoing loans each year to new applicants.

It's too hot to cook

Who wants to cook when it is this hot? Not me. But, I still want to eat! Here are some ideas for quick, easy, inexpensive meals to use when it's just too hot to cook.

Make fruit a meal: Try sweet, juicy melons or berries with a side of cottage cheese and whole wheat bread or yogurt topped with fruit and granola. Similar ideas might include yogurt parfaits; fresh fruit cocktail; fruit salsa; layered fruit and cereal; mango salsa; fruit smoothies breakfast banana splits; or Waldorf summer salad.

Vegetable ideas: Grill vegetables like onions, zucchini, peppers, eggplant, mushrooms and potatoes. Just slice them 1/4-1/2" thick and marinate in whatever

Italian salad dressing or vinaigrette you have on hand. Preheat the grill, then either use a grill basket or lay right on the oiled grate. Grill over medium heat for 5-20 minutes depending on the vegetable. Try making skewers with chunks of beef or chicken, or you might make a meal of just vegetables. (If you use potatoes you need to microwave them for a few minutes before you put them on the grill.)

Top of the Stove dishes: These dishes don't take long to make, and when cooking consider making extra so vegetables can just be reheated in the microwave: recipes to try might include omelets; three can chili; vegetable fried rice; or meat and veggie mac.

No Cook or Skillet Sandwiches

that you might try include: tuna melt sandwich, wraps; grilled cheese and fruit sandwich; vegetable sandwiches; tortilla wraps.

Try dips to eat with baked tortilla chips in scooped out tomatoes.

Salads that are big enough for a meal are also a great idea.

Finally, don't forget your slow-cooker. You can plug in anywhere and cook a roast or chicken and vegetables while you are at work.


