

# Wild goose chase



Officials with the Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism spent Wednesday afternoon tagging the wild geese at the Sebelius Reservoir/Prairie Dog State Park. The tagging process includes catching the geese and placing an ID tag around one leg of each bird. The tag includes a unique number and a website and phone number where the number can be reported if a goose is shot or found dead. The tagging process is done each year and helps wildlife officials track migration and population. Tags were attached to 92 birds at the lake.
