Blue Jays second, third at state cross country

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Coach George Rossi's Norton Community High School girls and boys cross country teams placed runner-up and third place, respectively, in the Class 3A State Cross Country Meet on Saturday at Rim Rock Farm, north of Lawrence.

"We were really proud of our girls, who ran their hearts out today," said coach Rossi. "We told our guys to run all out and see what happens and they really came out strong."

Douglass repeated as the girls champion with 76 points, followed by Norton, 94; Salina Sacred Heart, 121; Pleasant Ridge, 129; Riley County, 141; Southeast of Saline, 146; Sabetha, 159; Osage City, 176; Hays TMP, 200; Cimarron, 225; Fredonia, 266; Pittsburg-SMC, 270.

Hutch Trinity was the boys champion with 75 points, followed by Scott City, 110; Norton, 123; Holcomb, 133; Riley County, 136; Southeast of Saline, 139; Wellsville, 165; Marion, 173; Sabetha, 192; Cherokee-SE, 219; Silver Lake, 221; Burlington, 226.

This was the fourth straight year that both the Norton girls and boys have qualified as teams for the state meet. Last year, the Lady Jays also placed runner-up and the boys were fourth in the state meet.

A week ago, the Norton girls won the Regional championship and the boys were runner-up.

Also this season, the Norton girls won the Norton Invitational for the seventh year in a row and the boys won it for the fourth straight year. Also, the Norton girls won the Mid-Continent League championship for the fifth year in a row and the Norton boys were league champions for the ninth straight year.

GIRLS

Sophomore Sierra Griffith led the Norton girls to the finish line with a personal record time of 16:38 and 18th place finish to earn a medal.

Second fastest for the Lady Jays was senior Julia Kent, who was timed in 17:02 and placed 26th. She was followed by junior Darcy Bainter, 17:10, 29th; junior Katelyn Engelbert, 17:18, 32nd and freshman Molly Maddy, 17:31, 37th.

Also running for the Norton girls were senior Kamilla Jones, 17:37, 43rd and junior Marisa Maddy, 18:10, 66th.

"We knew that Douglass could win but we believed we had a shot at them and it just did not work out," said coach Rossi. "Our average time was faster than last year and five of our seven girls ran an average of 30 seconds faster than they did last year but this year's race was blazing fast.

"Sierra Griffith set a personal best and also became a two time All-State runner despite having a touch of stomach flu.

"Julia, Darcy, Katelyn, Molly, Kamilla and Marisa all ran very good races.

"This team comes out race after race and competes with everything they have. We have had a target on our back all year and we were able to fight it off every

"Douglass had not had a full team until the regional race but their top four girls all placed in the top 15 last year and they medaled all four again this year. We just don't have the speed to match that. We did beat some outstanding teams for second. Pleasant Ridge had beaten us at Rim Rock earlier and Sacred Heart and Riley County ran very close to us in other races."

Junior Marc Miller was fastest for the Norton boys with a personal record time of 17:28 and 13th place to earn a medal.

Blue Jay freshman Brendon Frack ran an outstanding race with a personal record time of 17:44 and 22nd finish. He was followed by junior Alec Hager, personal record 17:55 and 30th; sophomore Dalton Vanover, personal record 18:25, 45th and senior John Renner, season best 19:15, 77th.

Also running for Norton were junior Keith Sander, season best 20:25, 95th and senior Ryan Bainter, 21:05, 97th.

"Marc Miller had a personal record time and became an All-State runner," said coach Rossi.

"Brendon Frack was the fastest freshman in 3A and narrowly missed a medal with a personal record. Alec Hager also set a personal record on the tough Rim Rock course. Dalton Vanover improved his time from last year by over a minute and set a personal record. John Renner ran a season best time and was our fifth runner who sealed up the third place trophy over the No.1 ranked Holcomb Longhorns.

"This is the first time since 2006 and only the second time our boys have brought home a trophy from state. These young men laid it all on the line and it paid off. They have had a good season but placing at state is the icing on the cake. We are very, very proud of them!"


