New graders on to do list

Dustin Daniels, who works for Foley Equipment, talked to the Norton County commissioners on Monday on the advantages of purchasing Caterpillar motor graders for the Road and Bridge Department.

The county is looking at trading in four 1992 Caterpillar graders and getting three new or used graders to upgrade the county equipment and hopefully save some money on maintenance costs.

Mr. Daniels told the commissioners that Caterpillar builds all its own graders in plants in Little Rock, Ark., and Brazil.

He said that the company provides excellent dealer sup-

port and the machines have a great resell value. He also gave figures showing a low cost of maintenance and ownership.

The company would give the county a good deal on the trade ins, he said.

He gave the commissioners two types of graders to replace the old equipment, both types would include a cold-weather package and five-year warranty, he said.

The first, is a larger model and the second a small one, but even the small machines would still do the job and have more horsepower than the trade ins and have better fuel efficiency.

The advantage of the larger graders is more horsepower, which could be helpful in pulling ditch material back up on

the road or moving snow.

The small machines burn less fuel in light blading and would probably do most jobs just fine.

Caterpillar might be a little higher than some machines in the initial purchase, he noted, but the company will provide excellent financing for five years and the machines should be cheaper to maintain and have better resell value.

All Caterpillar graders have joy stick controls he said, which are fairly easy to learn and the company will provide training.

The commissioners thanked him and told him that they are definitely interested in purchasing some new machines if they can swing it financially but need to wait for at least one more company's bid.

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
