# Agency issues burn advisory

Adrian J. Polansky, State Executive Director of U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) and Eric B. Banks, State Conservationist for USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Kansas have issued a joint burn advisory.

Kansas landowners and operators enrolled in Conservation Reserve Program contracts with prescribed burns planned or scheduled to be completed should be aware that persistent drought conditions across Kansas are creating conditions unsuitable for completing burns. Dry soil conditions, wind speeds, low relative humidity, continued drought and current weather are all ongoing factors that are producing unsafe conditions for burns and will produce results outside the defined objectives for which the practice is planned.

Areas designated as D1 or higher on the U.S. Drought monitor map or where similar conditions exist should not be completing a prescribed burning practice. U.S. Drought Monitor can be located on the internet at: droughtmonitor.unl. edu/. Completing a burn under these conditions may increase the potential for unfavorable results such as severe wind erosion or place personal property or safety at risk.

Prescribed burning is an im-

portant component in most plant communities across Kansas. Equally as important as the need for continued prescribed burning activities is the message of use only during safe and predictable climatic conditions.

Conservation Reserve Program participants should contact their local USDA Service Center and visit with employees at the FSA or the NRCS office to discuss modifying the time frame for completing the planned prescribed burn practice. Also, Environmental Quality Incentives Program and Wildlife Habitat Incentive Program Participants should contact their Local NRCS office to discuss planned prescribed burns.

## Self-regulation vote will be in May

Midwest Energy is conducting a vote of its 49,000 customer-owners in May to become selfregulated, returning most decision-making authority from the Kansas Corporation Commission (KCC) to its member-elected Board of Directors.

"Self-regulation would benefit members by returning most decision-making authority on rates, rate design, and terms of service to our memberelected Board of Directors, who share a common ownership interest with all customer-owners," said Pat Parke, Midwest Energy's Vice President for Customer Service. "We will be more efficient and transparent, at a lower cost. But, customers will still have an appeals process to the KCC on rate decisions."

Members of 27 of the 29 Kansas electric cooperatives have voted to self-regulate since the legislature first allowed it in 1992.

Midwest Energy has mailed informational brochures to inform its members on self-regulation, and is hosting a series of member meetings to discuss it in the coming weeks. The schedule is:

"By being self-regulated, we can respond faster to the changing needs of our customer-owners and the changing nature of our business," said Earnie Lehman, Midwest Energy's President and General Manager. "Our Board can make decisions faster as well as better than a regulatory agency with no local ties."

Lehman added that ballots will be going out to all Midwest Energy customers, after the last member meeting in April.

"If you pay a Midwest Energy bill, you have an ownership stake in our cooperative," Lehman said. "We encourage our members to exercise their rights and vote 'yes' when their ballot arrives," he added.

## Program gives students law experience

Students get to spend one week at KHP Training Acad-

High school students interested in law enforcement will have the opportunity this summer to see what law enforcement training and careers are like through the Cadet Law Enforcement Academy. The Cadet Law Enforcement Academy program is hosted by the Patrol, and sponsored by the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary. Cadet Law this year will be held from June 9-June 14.

The goal of Cadet Law is to give young men and women an opportunity to learn more about what law enforcement jobs entail-the duties, training, and discipline that go along with a career in the field. It teaches high school students a great deal about leadership, and about coming together as a team.

"Cadet Law was what ultimately made me decide that I wanted to be a state trooper. It showed me a small part of what every trooper has to go through to be where they are today. It teaches high school kids responsibility and to respect the job state troopers have. For me, it gave me a goal to work towards," said current KHP Trooper Lindsey Murphy, a Cadet Law graduate. "I knew that getting through the academy would not be easy, so I started working on getting in shape mentally and physically. If I hadn't gone to Cadet Law, I don't think I would have been so motivated and determined to do everything I could to become a state trooper.

Students at Cadet Law are coached by KHP troopers who spend the week in Salina, encouraging the students, and helping them develop. College students who have attended the KHP Collegiate Law program will help mentor the high school students throughout the week.

Throughout the week the cadets have a rigorous schedule to follow. The students experience a variety of classroom instruction, and the real-world activities of a trooper. Cadets go to the firing range to practice using firearms. They also practice pursuit driving at the driving

range, ride with the Patrol's pilots in agency airplanes, and see presentations from the Patrol's canine handlers. Car stop scenarios are practiced. Physical training and attention to detail are both emphasized throughout the duration of the training.

In order for a student to be eligible to attend Cadet Law, students must be in the summer between their Junior and Senior years of high school and must have a "C+" academic average. Students must be deemed medically fit to participate in all activities. Students will need to fill out an application to attend, including writing a brief essay on why they would like to participate in the program. Applications are due by March 31, 2013. Students should contact the American Legion at (785) 232-9315 for an application and further information. There is no cost to the cadet, but there is a \$300 sponsorship fee by the local American Legion Post or American Legion Auxiliary Post. Lodging, food, and uniform are provided for the week.




