New graders delivered

dpaxton@nwkansas.com Dustin Daniels of Foley Equipment and a CAT representative addressed the Norton County Commissioners at last week's meeting. He had a lot of paperwork that needed to be signed due to the purchase of three new road graders from his company.

Originally, it had been decided to purchase the new 2013 120M graders by way of trading four old ones owned by the county and paying the difference. But since Mr. Daniels met with Commissioner Richard Thompson last week to discuss another model of grader, the decision has changed. It was reported that they decided to go with the 2012 12M used graders instead since they were cheaper, saving the county money.

Mr Daniels told the commissioners that the first payment would be due on March 19 of 2014. Another thing that was thrown in by the CAT dealer was a \$2500 parts credit per machine and 2.495 financing to help lower the payment price.

The new graders were delivered last Thursday afternoon. Norton County Clerk Robert Wyatt said, "We got bigger machines, the parts credit and less then \$7,000 difference in price, it was a good deal."

Commissioner R.A. Peterson asked County Attorney Doug Sebelius what steps needed to be taken since it was originally agreed on to buy the 2013 models. Mr. Sebelius said that there needed to be a motion to modify the previous action taken on 3-18-13 about the purchase of the graders from the 120 to the 12M machines at an adjusted annual price of \$84,472.72. Mr. Peterson made the motion and it was seconded and passed. While there, Mr. Sebelius read over the contract with CAT and Mr. Thompson signed all of the paperwork making everything final in the purchase of the three new graders.

Wente was to start at her office on Monday April first but that she had already been coming in to familiarize herself with the job. "She will need training in Topeka in mid May but she is trainable and is fine with taking care of the money at the end of the day. We are excited for her to start although we know it will be a huge change for her as far as work environment," Mrs. Linner stated.

The last visitor of the day was Norton County Sheriff, Troy Thomson. The sheriff reported that one of the county sheriff's vehicles, a 2001 Ford pickup that was parked at officer Adam Wahlmeier's residence, was hit by another vehicle. The damage included a buckled tailgate and truck bed. "We are waiting on an estimate now." Thomson said. The commissioners asked if the person that hit the vehicle was insured and Mr. Thomson reported that yes she was.

In other business with the commissioners, Mr. Thomson said, "The current jail population is standing at eight. With the new record management system we are able to better track occupancy numbers and it showed that on average it is four to five prisoners a day but that it has jumped to 6.87 a day and that 25 percent of the population are new female prisoners."

An issue that must be delt with in reference to jail prisoners is that of medical care which can be very costly. Mr. Thomson reported that the county works with Correctional Care Solutions for aid with medical bills and billing with medicare. Thanks to this option the county only has to pay \$17.50 per claim which saves the department money.

Mr. Thomson also reported that his officers will be attend-

ing a training on mental health issues. This class will help officers identify if prisoners are faking or if there is a legitimate mental health issue that needs to be dealt with.


