


Plans for pool discussed at city council

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The Norton City Council met in regular session on Wednesday and Kevin McElyea of Aquatic Designs Consultants, Inc. was present to discuss the final designs for the pool project.

Council member Ron Briery said he wanted at least 30 days to review the final plans and specifications before any decisions are made. McElyea stated a set of plans were delivered to the City a few weeks prior, and he is trying to hit the bidding window for the season. The contractor would not begin work until

after the pool season is over.

Briery said he is concerned about the soil report and is worried there might be a problem with the base under the pool. McElyea said he isn't concerned about the soil reports based on where the building will be, and the pool design is based on the soil report. McElyea also said if the pool is going to be built this year, a contractor needs to be in place if it is to be completed in time to open for the next season. Inspections will be conducted on the concrete breaks which is included in the total cost of the pool.

Briery made a motion, seconded by Jeff Urban, to have an additional 30 days to look over the plans and specifications before proceeding with the bidding process. The motion tied 3-3, with Briery, Urban and Jones voting yes, and Foley, Harriett Gill and Roberta Ryan voting no. Mayor David Corns broke the tie, voting no, and the motion failed.

McElyea stated all of their projects are done by representatively drilling sample and the designs are planned accordingly, and that they know how important the soil reports are. McE-

lyea said they will dig out the profile of the pool and sub-grade. The remaining soil will have to be conditioned, and a professional will be there testing for optimum moisture content to get the desired compaction.

Briery made another motion to hire Penco Engineering to look after the City's interests when the pool bids are let. Terracon Consultants, Inc. conducted the soil survey, but Briery said he thinks Penco should do the testing and run the compaction on the ground. The motion passed unanimously. The

Postal changes affect us all

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As most of you know there have been a lot of changes going on with our local postal system. The newest one will greatly affect the Norton Telegram deadlines.

As of Saturday, the mail truck taking the mail to Hays which will then go on to Wichita, will have an earlier departure time. What does this mean for the Telegram? It means that we must have our paper completed, to the printers, picked up and returned to the Norton Post Office no later than 11:30 a.m. every Monday, Tuesday and Friday. How does this affect deadlines you may ask. Our normal deadline to have the paper completed, proofed, corrected and sent to the printers is 7 a.m. the day the paper comes out. With the new schedule we will have to have all of this done by 4 p.m. the day before.

Ad deadlines will remain the same but if it is past the deadline your ad will not get in until the next paper. So please pay very close attention to our dead-

lines so that we can be sure to get your ads in when you need them to run.

The biggest issue we will face will be that of receiving death notices and obituaries. Our normal deadline for obituaries is by 4 p.m. the day before the paper comes out; we will now have to move that deadline back to noon the day before the paper comes out.

We know that school is almost out but that might be another problem area when it comes to getting the school calendar and menu in time for paper make up. Those normally run on Fridays but if for some reason we do not get them in time they will not be printed in the paper.

We do the very best we can to keep our readers informed on local activities and events and we wish we could cover everything but if we don't know about it, we can't cover it and if you want certain things run on certain days we ask that you do not turn them in past the set deadlines. The new postal changes affect us all in one way or another so lets work together.
