**ORDINANCE NO. 358  
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SOLID WASTE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL CHARGES WITHIN THE CITY OF LENORA, KANSAS**  
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LENORA, KANSAS:

**SECTION ONE.** Section 15-523 of the Code of the City of Lenora, Kansas, is hereby amended to read as follows: The following schedule of charges is hereby established as reasonable and in accordance with the requirements of the County solid waste system and the volume of refuse handled from the following classifications of residences, dwellings and commercial establishments, to-wit: "FEE SCHEDULE.

(a) For each single-family dwelling or each unit of a multiple-family dwelling containing three (3) or less dwelling units within the City, \$15.40 per month will be charged.

(b) For each home-based business, monthly charges shall be \$17.60. For each commercial establishment and each multi-family dwelling containing more than three (3) dwelling units within the City, monthly charges shall be \$24.75. For those establishments or dwelling units utilizing a trash dumpster, the charge shall be \$35.75 per collection. Solid waste placed for collection, which exceeds the capacity of the dumpster at the time of collection will be assessed an extra pick up charge.

(c) Mobile home courts shall be charged fees established in the same manner and at the same rate as commercial establishments; however, for each mobile home that may be serviced individually, the normal residential charge of \$15.40 per month shall apply.

(d) Collection service outside the corporate limits of the City of Lenora using a dumpster shall be charged \$35.75 per month and collection service outside the corporate limits of the City of Lenora without a dumpster shall be charged \$15.95 per month."

**SECTION TWO.** Ordinances of the City of Lenora, Kansas in conflict with the terms of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

**SECTION THREE.** This ordinance shall be published in the official City newspaper and shall take effect on September 1, 2013.

would purchase the material and spread it.

"We'll pay for the sand and put it on the road," Mr. Richard said, thanking Mr. McKenna for

his generous offer.

The commissioners also agreed that Ms. Wilson should get a program for her road and bridge computer that maps out all the roads in the county. The program has multiple layers, she

said, and each one costs \$2,500. There are layers for roads, bridges, culverts and signs.

"Right now the roads would be the most important," she said.

The commissioners agreed and said she could get the

program, which will help the county track what work was done on each road in the county and by whom, what equipment was used on each job and how many man hours of work was required for each job.

by the late Francis Schulze and his friend Bob Brown. It has a front cantilevered transverse spring suspension and weighs less than 1,200 pounds. It was considered "ahead of its time" when it was first built. Schulze drove the car until Sept. 1951 in Wayne, Neb., when he crashed, splitting the car in two and losing his life. The Schulze family gave McMullen and Bantam their permission to rebuild No. 81 and put it back on the track.

"It took about fourteen months to rebuild the car," Bantam said. "Don was to do the driving and I would take care of the mechanical work that needed done." They faced several obstacles during the rebuild, like figuring out how the springs on the front end were mounted and where the rear end and engine were set on an inner frame that pivots inside the main frame of the car. Yet after months of hard work and dedication their efforts paid off.

The two men raced together for many years, with McMullen in No. 81 and Bantam in No. 8, a car built by Bob and Gerald Brown in 1952. With so many stories and memories to share there will be a picnic in the park on Sunday so that drivers can do just that, reminisce about times on the track, the building of their cars and Don. So bring the family between noon and three p.m. Sunday afternoon and enjoy fried chicken, potato salad, baked beans, brownies and

homemade ice cream for nothing more than a free will donation. While there, take a peak at the quilt show that will be taking place in the gazebo.

The URSS 305 and IMCA Non-sanctioned Winged Sprint cars and IMCA Stock cars will be the competition attractions both nights.
