icy, to include a \$500 refundable deposit, require six percent air entrainment, and not allow flowable fill to be used. The contractor will be responsible for the brick paver installation.

-invited Nancy Kent and Kristine Knapp to meet with a council committee to work on color options for the new pool project.

-the City office will send a

copy of the utility bills to any residents who are set up for bank bill payment.

-approved the purchase of two automatic door operators with remote push pads for handicap accessibility at Northwest Kansas Library System and the Norton Public Library at a cost of \$3292 installed for each location.

-raised the city's maximum contribution for the employees' health insurance to the cost of

each plan under Option 3.

-authorized City Attorney to prepare an ordinance to set the dumping station prices and hours for the dumping station at the sewer plant. The dumping station is open Monday through Friday.

-approved the request of Norton Post Prom to use the livestock barn in Elmwood Park on Sept. 13 and Oct. 18, for fundraisers.

-authorized the Mayor to sign

a participation agreement and approve the Gard Trust agreement with Colonial Life Insurance, at no cost to the City. The motion passed 3-2, with Jones and Briery voting no.

-approved Appropriating Ordinance #16.
