Norton has a new business in town. Pfonz Grill is located at the old Attitudes Restaurant and Lounge and is owned by Dan Pfannenstiel and Tammy Brungardt.

Dan quit his job in June and in July took on this venture with the full support of his friends and family. "Thank God for friends and family," Dan said. They officially opened the doors on October 3 offering prime rib, steaks, pasta, seafood, salmon and much more to the public. Not only is it a grill but on the back side of the restaurant one can find Pfonz Pub, a small cozy bar with big screen televisions.

The establishment employs fifteen staff, three of which are

full time. They are currently looking for daytime wait staff however. The restaurant seats 80 and the pub will seat 50. Their hours of operation on the restaurant side are 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Monday through Friday, 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Thursday and Friday and 5 p.m. to 10 p.m. on Saturdays. The pub is open from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. on Thursdays and 5 p.m. to midnight on Friday and Saturday.

The south side of the old building is currently being used for storage but eventually Dan hopes to turn it into a wedding hall. They also hope to start serving daily lunch specials in the near future.

"It has been really good so far," Dan said. "I can't thank Curtis Glenn, Mike Terrell, John

Rowh, Dave Riemann, Sondra Petrie, Patty Rowh, Monica Wilson, Dave and Lisa Donovan and my boys, Bo, Luke, Connor and Taylor enough for all their help. I couldn't have done it without them.

"The town needed a good place to eat and I really missed cooking. Besides all my friends kept telling me to cook again. Tammy has been a great support and is fifty fifty owner, yet she still works at the Credit Union and I work here full time," Dan stated.

The building got a nice facelift on the outside and a do-over on the inside. It is nice that Norton has another great eating establishment to go to so be sure to support them and check it out.

teach gun safety. All the youngsters will have to pass a written test on gun safety before they will be allowed to start shooting on the range."

Coach Elliott also thanked the Norton Rotary Club for assisting in finding a new shooting location for the team.

This Monday, Oct. 21, the prospective young marksmen will begin the first of three consecutive Monday evenings spent only in classroom education. After that, each Monday evening will involve equal amounts of classroom review and shooting practice. Practice will begin at 6:30 p.m. and will last about one and one-half hours, depending on the number of shooters and coaches.

"Family members of shooters can be involved as coaches, scorers and also any other help that is needed," said Jeff.

The young marksmen will have the opportunity to shoot in a number of regional and state shoots with the goal of qualifying for the national competition.

Valerie Elliott will be the classroom instructor this year. Those who missed the infor-

mational meeting and are still interested in participating are invited to attend this Monday's meeting at 6:30 p.m. in the former Sidles Building.

A winning tradition

Winning performances by Norton BB Gun Teams at the state and national (formerly international) level have earned them an admirable reputation in marksmanship circles.

Norton teams have won 38 Kansas state championships out of 48.

Norton has also competed in 43 of 48 international (now national) shoots and has also won eight international championships, more than any other community in the world!

The national shoot in Rogers, the home of Daisy Outdoor Products, is the largest junior marksmanship competition in the world!

Norton gun safety program used

Norton is associated with the beginning of the gun safety program. It is based on a format proposed by the late Norton

Jaycees member Duane Winder. This program was adopted nationwide when Daisy and the U.S. Jaycees began the program.

The program was designed to introduce young shooters to the basics of safe gun handling and marksmanship.

About 250,000 young people take part in the program each year.

In recent history, Norton won the international title in 1990, 1991, 1998 and 2000, placed second in 2003 and third in 1996. In 2008, Norton finished runner-up in shooting and fifth overall. Norton placed seventh in 2008 and qualified for but did not compete in the national shoot in 2009 before finishing ninth in 2010 and 2011 and seventh in 2012.

The top three marksmanship teams in each of the three state shoots will qualify to compete in the national shoot.

The Norton County BB Gun Team was originally sponsored by the Norton Jaycees and the Norton Rotary assumed sponsorship when there was no longer a Jaycees chapter in Norton.
