#### SHERIFF'S BLOTTER

The Decatur County Sheriff's office worked these calls last week:  
• At 9:40 p.m. Friday, Brock Euhus, 17, rolled his 1999 Ford pickup two miles west and five miles north of town on a gravel road. Mr. Euhus said he was driving west when he saw a deer, Deputy Jay Tate reported. The deputy said there are still several unanswered questions and the case is under investigation. Mr. Euhus said he had his seat belt on, Deputy Tate said.  
He said the driver's blood alcohol level was tested, but the sheriff's office hasn't reported the findings yet. Deputy Tate said one of the questions is whether there were pas-

sengers in the vehicle.  
No alcohol was found in the vehicle, he said, but there was alcohol near the scene.  
A county ambulance responded, but Mr. Euhus didn't need treatment. The Oberlin Police Department assisted with the accident.  
• At 8:24 a.m. Monday, Oct. 30, officers received a call of a possible domestic dispute eight miles south, 10 east, a mile north and three-quarter of a mile east, at the home of Pam Christensen, also known as Kayla Kump. Ms. Christensen, who lives at the home, and Von Vanmeter were arguing, said Deputy Tate. There wasn't any physical contact, and no one was arrested, he said.

## Teen New Year's party planned

J&R Marketing wants Colby to be party central for area teens on New Year's Eve — again.  
Plans are underway for the second annual Rappin' and Rockin' New Year's Eve party Dec. 31 in Colby.

Last year, she said, about 700 middle school, high school and college-aged students attended the all-night party.

Kicking off the end of 2006 will be a concert by Christian band Three Chords Wonder from Denver and Christian rap artist John Reuben at the Colby Community Building at 9 p.m., Mrs. Epp said, but the party is much more than the concert.  
After the music and pizza, partici-

pants will be bused across Colby for activities at Colby Community College, Heartland Christian School and Colby School District buildings, including basketball, dodge ball, bowling and a movie. Participants can stay at the Colby Community Building for video games and breakout sessions where they can talk about issues that relate to them.  
"This is such an important night for kids," Epp said. "We want to have our area kids have a good time on a fun night of the year — free from drugs and alcohol."  
Epp said about 40 students from Baptist Bible College of Springfield, Mo., will help run the events again this year.  
Only 1,000 tickets will be available. Get them at the His Shop and Farmers and Merchants Bank's Dillons branch in Colby, or at area churches.  
Doors will open at 7 p.m. on New Year's Eve, Mrs. Epp said, and the

event will end at 7 a.m. New Year's Day.

Decatur County commissioners approved the purchase of more chemicals for the noxious weed department to spray musk thistle at their meeting last Tuesday.  
Supervisor Gaylen Huntley said they are spraying for musk thistle now and will need more chemicals to get through the season.  
The commissioners OK'd the purchase, which will cost around

\$12,000.
