* Wheat prices jump over \$8

(Continued from Page 1A) crop is actually in from the field. Rain has been spotty for the corn, so no one knows yet.

Mr. O'Brien said he thinks the wheat price is at or near a record high, especially since it is past harvest. The price of wheat should have a good impact on the crop income this year, he said.

Soybeans, he added, have been this high in the past, but the price still is wonderful.

Greg Lohoefer, owner of Data Marketing in Oberlin, who advises

farmers on when and how to sell their crops, said the wheat price is obviously a record. The price has never been this high on wheat, he said.

The current price per bushel, said Mr. Lohoefer, is largely due to a low world and U.S. wheat stocks for the current marketing year, which will end June 1.

Normally, high prices like this lead to a significant increase in how many acres of wheat will be planted for next year's crop in the world and U.S., he said.

Seven counties in the region belong to the organization and each has a board that meets monthly to decide how best to sell the recyclable materials. This helps keep the items out of landfills, she said.

Decatur County uses a trailer on loan from the program, said Mrs. Horn. A recent grant will allow the county to buy its own trailer and a baler, which will help condense the material taken to Colby.

The trailer is parked between the Noxious Weed Department building and the old county shop on East Victoria Street, just south of town.

At first, the trailer was set up to take newspapers, corrugated cardboard, chipboard, some plastics and office paper. The list has expanded and the trailer can now take plastic grocery bags.

With plastics, since there are so many kinds, Mrs. Horn said, most items have a number on the bottom. If it is a No. 7, she said, that means it can't be recycled.

No. 1 items include: soda and salad dressing bottles and No. 2 items including milk jugs. All containers need to be rinsed out, lids removed and flattened if possible.

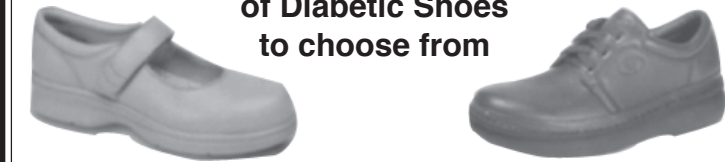
The trailer does not have a place for motor-oil containers, she added.

GENERAL NOTICE TO CONTROL NOXIOUS WEEDS

The Kansas Noxious Weed Law K.S.A. 2-1314 et seq requires all persons who own or supervise land in Kansas to control and eradicate all weeds declared noxious by legislative action. The weeds declared noxious are: Field Bindweed, Musk Thistle, Serica Lespedeza, Johnson Grass, Canada Thistle, Bur Ragweed, Leafy Spurge, Hoary Cress, Quack Grass, Russian Knapweed, Kudzu, & Pignut. Multiflora Rose is a County Option Noxious Weed declared noxious by the Board of County Commissioners of Decatur County. Notice is hereby given pursuant to the Kansas Noxious Weed Law to every person who owns or supervises land in Decatur County that noxious weeds growing or found on such land shall be controlled and eradicated. Control is defined as preventing the production of viable seeds and the vegetative spread of the plant.

Failure to observe this notice may result in the County:
1. Serving a legal notice requiring control of the noxious weeds within a minimum of 5 days. Failure to control the noxious weeds within the time period allowed may result in the county treating the noxious weeds at the landowners expense and placing a lien on the property if the bill is not paid within 30 days or,
2. filing criminal charges for non compliance. Conviction for non compliance may result in a fine of \$100 per day of non compliance with a maximum fine of \$1500.
The public is also hereby notified that it is a violation of Kansas Noxious Weed Law to barter, sell, or give away infested nursery stock or livestock feed unless the feed is fed on the farm where grown or sold to a commercial processor that will destroy the viability of the noxious weed seed. Custom harvesting machines must be labeled with a label provided by the Kansas. Dept. of Agriculture and must be free of all weed seed and litter when entering the State and when leaving a field infested with noxious weeds.
