in the south courtyard craft stations were set up with everything from purses, to knitted items to home-grown pumpkins.

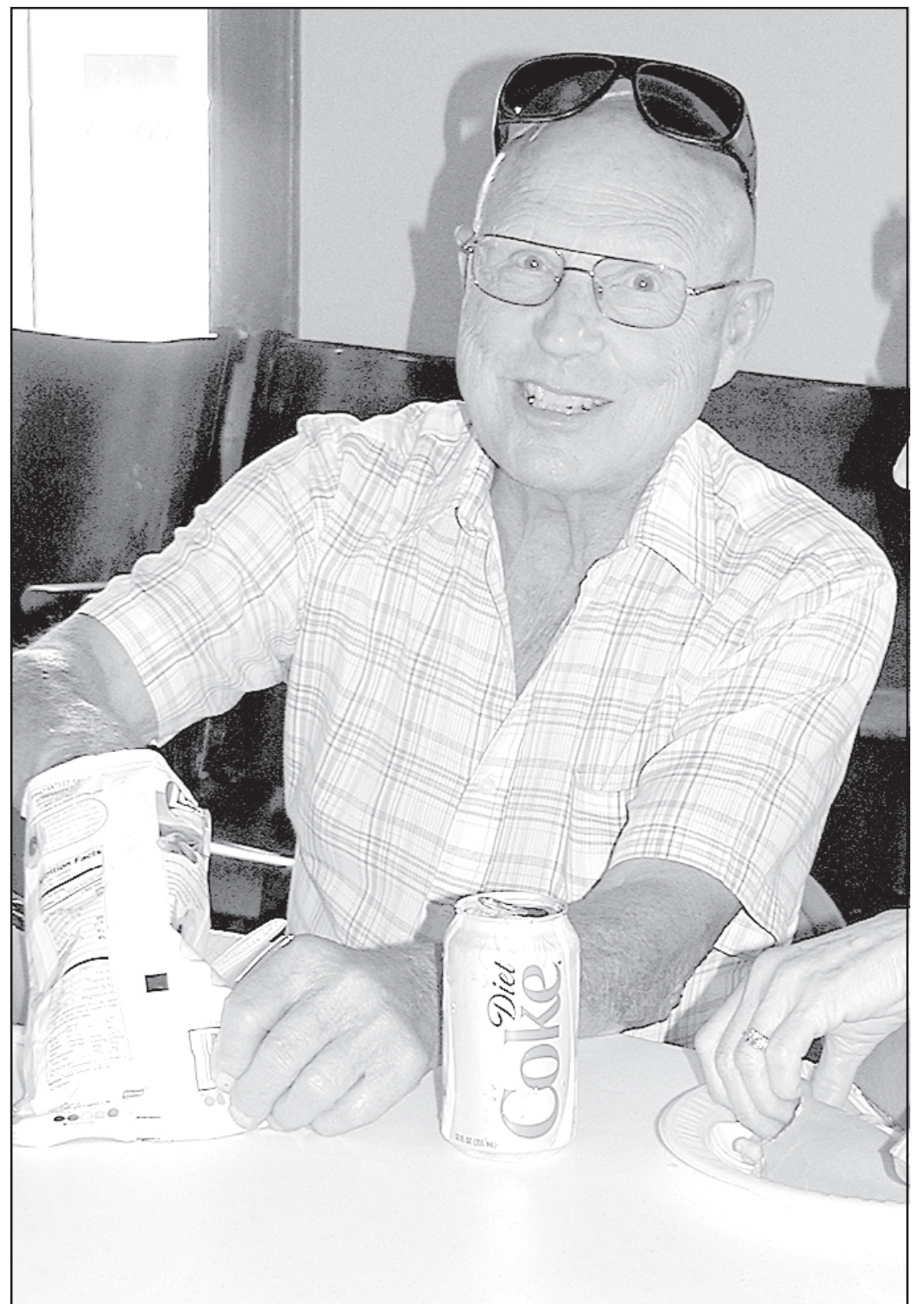
While some people shopped, others looked at the exhibits inside of the 14 buildings at the museum.
