

Interim manager takes helm

A former manager is back in the saddle at the Decatur Co-op, taking over the lead position until a new general manager is hired.

John Juenemann, who retired 13 years ago, is back at the co-op, serving as the interim manager while the board works on hiring a full-time general manager.

Mr. Juenemann said he worked at the co-op for 32 years, 28 as general manager. He took early retirement because of cancer, but has come through that. Later, he said, he thought if he could stay in good health, he might serve as an interim manager for a co-op somewhere, but never thought it would be in Oberlin.

City working

The City of Oberlin expects to get recommendations from a consultant soon to help officials negotiate a power agreement with Sunflower Wind, but still hasn't received a contract for his services.

Since August, Sunflower Wind has been trying to reach an agreement with the city to provide electricity through a wind farm the firm plans to build in Decatur County.

The firm's first proposal included canceling the city's current contracts with Sunflower Electric Power Co. and with the Western Area Power Administration for federal hydropower. The second proposal was for a right of first refusal allowing the firm to meet any offer the city might get. The City Council rejected both, but said it would work with Sunflower Wind if the right of first refusal was taken out of the contract.

City Administrator Gary Shike said he talked with Joe Herz, an independent expert who the city hired to look at the original contract from Sunflower Wind. He told the council that he wouldn't recommend accepting anything with a right of first refusal in it.

Mr. Shike said Mr. Herz had sent out an agreement between himself and the city, but the city hasn't yet received it.

Brice Barton, with Sunflower Wind, said he has tried to call Mr. Herz about 30 times but he hasn't received a call back.

Mr. Barton said there isn't anything new to report, adding that he didn't think the city was being very cooperative.
