County defers radio decision

The Decatur County commissioners put off a decision about a new radio for the dispatch office at their meeting last Tuesday because one of the three members was gone.

Chief Dispatcher Marilyn Mack said \$33,429 of the cost would be covered by a grant, \$22,000 by money from the 911 fund and they would need \$15,215 from county general funds.

If the commissioners don't want to get a new radio before the end of December, said Mrs. Mack, they need to file for an extension on the grant.

The commissioners said they would wait to make a decision until Commissioner Gene Gallentine, who was not at the meeting on Tuesday, could be present.
