Leaky sewer pipes close down clinic for a few days

A sewer leak forced the Oberlin Clinic to close at the beginning of last week, but after three days, the line was fixed and the doctors are back to business as usual.

Administrator Barb Whitney said they had noticed the smell for two weeks and reported it to the maintenance department at the hospital, which takes care of the clinic building. Mrs. Whitney said she even called Midwest Energy to check the gas, just in case.

Hospital Administrator Lynn Doeden said when the maintenance crew checked the clinic, they didn't notice a smell. When the leak finally was discovered, the hospital offered its specialty clinic for the doctors to use, said Mrs. Doeden.

Lisa Votapka, the clinic's contracted housekeeper, actually found the leak in a tunnel under an older part of the building, off of the furnace room.

Basically the sewer backed up and sewage seeped out of the older pipes in the tunnel, said clinic manager Barb Whitney. That Sunday when the leak was found, May 9, said Mrs. Whitney, there were three to four inches of sewage in the tunnel. She added that there was a film on the sludge on the walls that apparently had been there for a while.

Mrs. Whitney said she and her

husband were at the clinic that Sunday. Her husband who is licensed, looked at the leak. Voltz Plumbing out of McCook came and replaced the sewer lines under the older part of the building, fixing the leak, she said.

The clinic was closed on Monday and Tuesday, said Mrs. Whitney. On Wednesday, nurse practitioner Jonna Inman went to Jennings to see patients and physician's assistant Jennifer Taylor went to Atwood. Both are regular outreach clinics, she said, but together, they saw just five patients.

Dr. Stelian Andrecu went to the nursing homes on Tuesday, said Mrs. Whitney, and the staff was in the office that day authorizing prescription refills and taking phone calls. On Thursday morning, the clinic opened back up.

Dr. Elizabeth Sliter was on vacation last week, Mrs. Whitney said, but Dr. Andrecu saw patients in the emergency room at the hospital.

Most people rescheduled their appointments, so the clinic has been pretty much full ever since re-opening on Thursday.

While Mrs. Whitney said she and Dr. Andrecu were at the office every day to stay on top of things and air the building out, with the leak, they just didn't see patients.

Vacation Bible School set

Registration forms, she said, went out in church bulletins. The forms are also available at Raye's Grocery and the public library. People can turn them in to the same places. The volunteers hope parents

will preregister their kids, she said.

The theme, said Mrs. Abbey, is about parables. The kids will learn a Bible parable each day, including the story of the sower, the lost sheep, the good samaritan, the friend at midnight and the talents. Each day, she said, there will be skits, an opening, a closing and lots of fun.

On the last day, parents and families will be invited to bring a sack lunch and join their kids.

District surveys parents

The number of possible kindergartners for the fall term could mean either hiring another teacher to having two sections or going back to half-day classes, Oberlin School Board members learned last week.

At the board meeting last Monday, Superintendent Duane Dorshorst said the district could have 25 to 26 kindergartners enrolled next year. He said the school had planned on 19 to 21.

This year there are 23 in the all-day class. There's only one section, with teacher Diana Steinmetz and two aides, Kelly Shields in the morning and Lois Wentz all day.

Mr. Dorshorst said the parents of four children haven't yet decided if they will send them to kindergarten next year.

With 25 to 26 students, said Mr. Dorshorst, the district might need to hire another kindergarten teacher and have two sections of all-day kindergarten. The other idea was to go back to having half the students in a morning section and the other half in the afternoon.

This is the third year of all-day kindergarten, Mr. Dorshorst said, but it's the first year since all-day kindergarten started that there's only been one section.

Mr. Dorshorst said the district sent a survey to the parents of prospective kindergartners about half day classes. So far, a few of the surveys have come back, and none of them is in favor of half-day kindergarten.

The board decided to discuss the class at its June meeting.

Board recognizes students

The Oberlin School Board congratulated the speech team and vocal and band students at a meeting last Monday.

Superintendent Duane Dorshorst said Oberlin Lions Club members worked 100 times during the year, taking tickets at athletic events and other volunteer jobs, saving the district \$900.

The school district, he said, appreciates the volunteers coming in to help. There aren't enough

teachers to cover everything. The volunteers working at the ticket booths and the doors help the district be able to hold the events.

In other business, the board:

- Approved hiring Kerrie Olson Wahlmeier, who graduated from Decatur Community High School in 2004, for an open teaching position at the grade school.

- Accepted a \$300 donation from Janet Rorick for the weight room remodeling project.

- Accepted a \$1,616 rebate check from Nex-Tech Wireless.

- Approved a speech class waiver for senior Hunter Nedland, a member of the speech team, who

has met all the requirements.

- Accepted a \$1,000 gift for the high school library from the Love family and the Greater Salina Community Foundation.

- Adopted new curricula for Spanish and the library.

- Bought new textbooks for language arts, or English, for \$30,000.

- Held closed sessions for 10, 5 and 10 minutes to discuss teacher contract negotiations. There was no action taken.

- Held a 10-minute closed session to discuss student matters. There was no action taken.

County reviews pay-grade chart

The Decatur County commissioners talked briefly about the pay grades and steps for county employees at their meeting last Tuesday.

A chart showed various pay grades, from an office job to a department head, with steps for length of service. Employees can move up the grades and steps to get pay raises.

The commissioners found out that some employees aren't on the chart because they are at a higher grade than it shows.

The chart only goes to grade 25 and step 11, said County Clerk Colleen Geihlsler.

Commissioner Stan McEvoy said he thought they needed to put more grades on the chart because all of the jobs aren't covered. Some of

the lower grades, he said, don't have anyone in them.

The jobs should also be aligned, said Commissioner Ralph Unger, so similar ones in different offices are in the same grade.

Mr. Unger said he would talk with a commissioner from another county and see what they are going

to do.

Mr. McEvoy said he would take the information home and look at adding more grades.

The grade and steps chart, said County Attorney Steve Hirsch, was done and then the employees were put into the chart depending on what they were making at the time.
