She was born Dec. 12, 1926, near Jennings, the daughter of Henry and Mary Blanche (Richardson) Heilman. She was reared on the family farm near Jennings which continues to be farmed by her nephew, Bill Heilman. She graduated from Jennings High School in 1944 and attended Central Business School in Denver before joining the United States Nursing Corps. She was a 1948 graduate of the Mercy School of Nursing.

She married Don Zimmerman on Jan. 26, 1948, at the St. Joseph Catholic Church in New Alamo. Their first home was in Hays where her husband attended school and she worked at St. Anthony's Hospital. They then moved to Denver where her husband entered Hagan School of Horology and she was a surgical nurse at Mercy Hospital. In June of 1950, the couple moved to Oberlin.

She helped open the new Decatur County Hospital and worked as a registered nurse there for 38 years. She served as the director of nurses and operating room supervisor. She also participated in nursing study tours, traveling to Germany, Belgium, Switzerland, Spain, Africa, and China. She was a member of Sacred Heart Catholic Church and its Altar Society, the Kansas Society

of Nurse Service Administrators and the Association of Operating Room Nurses, and an associate member of the Zeta Nu Club.

She was preceded in death by her husband, her parents, and two brothers.

Survivors include her daughters, Linda and Damian Marintzer, Westminster, Colo.; Debbie and Ted Scheufler, Tempe, Ariz.; and Karen and William Buxton, Brighton, Colo.; two sisters, Helen and Keith Muirhead, Dresden; and Betty and Bill Kelley, Junction City; eight grandchildren; and special friend, Bob Ross.

The City of Oberlin, Kansas will receive sealed bids for the Oberlin Cemetery Ornamental Wall. Bids prepared in accordance with the Plans and Specifications will be accepted at the Office of the Clerk, 1 Morgan Drive, Oberlin, Kansas 67749 until 2:00 P.M. CDST on June 15, 2010 and then will be immediately publicly opened and read aloud.

The project consists of a concrete and masonry wall and associated work as described in the Plans and Specifications. Contractors will be required to bid all items on the project bid form.
