Board accepts gift of wood

The Oberlin School Board accepted a gift of ash, cedar and walnut lumber from an Oberlin man for the industrial arts shop at the high school.

Superintendent Duane Dorshorst said Phil Shields cut the wood years ago. He said he didn't need it, so he wanted to give it to the high school.

After some was thrown out because of mold, the donation was worth approximately \$1,100, he said.

Board member Dan Nedland went through the policies and the candidates information for the upcoming Kansas Association of School Boards convention in Topeka.

The board named Mr. Nedland to act on the district's behalf as he

sees fit.

Mr. Dorshorst said the auditor with Mapes and Miller had been here and said the district could void any outstanding checks from 2004 to 2008. In the past, the auditor had suggested keeping the checks on the book, but this time they said to void them.

The money from the voided checks will go back into the capital outlay fund, he said.

The board decided to move the meeting next month up to 5:30 p.m. Monday, Dec. 13, in the high school library.

It's the same night as the kindergarten through third grade winter program, which will be in the high school auditorium.

In other business, the board:

- Heard that Donuts for Dads will be held at 8 a.m. at the grade school on Wednesday, Dec. 8. Kids will invite their fathers to school for breakfast.

- Heard that positive comments have outweighed the negative for the new eight-period day at the high school. There are more students in vocational programs this year with the extra class period, said Mr. Dorshorst.

- Approved revised policies for second reading. During the October meeting, the board went through the policies.

- Tabled action on the superintendent's evaluation tool.

Volunteers needed for drug council

Volunteers are needed to serve on the Decatur County Drug and Alcohol Council.

Deanna Castle, a council member, said the group only meets as needed, but needs a few more members.

Recently, she said the council bought new preliminary breath testing equipment for the city police and county sheriff's officers. Those are used in the field to test if someone has been drinking.

The council has lots of visual

aids for organizations to use and education materials on drugs and alcohol.

The council bought some videos that will be shown during the county fair next year. One is "Just Call Me Crash," about drinking and driving, and the other is "In Box," about social networking and cyberbullying.

The council is working with school nurse Johanna Mason, who is also a member, about presenting

the "Love and Logic" curriculum, designed to help parents and teachers raise responsible kids. Anyone interested in taking the class can contact her at 475-2122.

The council supports the annual after-prom party, said Mrs. Castle, and plans a spring poster contest.

Members include Mrs. Castle, Police Chief Wade Lockhart, Officer Troy Haas, teacher Wendy Scott and Mrs. Mason.

Gordon Fought, 91, a former Oberlin resident, died Nov. 9, 2010, at the Norton County Hospital.

He was born July 17, 1919, in Oronque, the son of Theodore and Winnifred (Davis) Fought. He attended the Oronque school before moving with his parents to a farm northwest of Lenora. He graduated from Lenora High School in 1937.

He married Creta Mae Chase on Nov. 1, 1942. They moved to Norton in 1945, where he worked for the Vancura and Son John Deere dealership. In 1952, they moved to Oberlin where he worked for Nitsch and Nitsch until 1956, when they returned to Norton and they bought into the John Deere business. They sold the business in 1974 and he

worked for the Rowh Motor Company car dealership until his retirement in 1982.

He was a member of the Norton Christian Church, Masonic Lodge, Odd Fellows Lodge and Norton Lions Club.

Survivors include his wife, Creta Mae, Norton; two sons, Don and Vicki Fought, Winston-Salem, N.C.; and Jim and Tina Fought, Park City, Utah; a son-in-law, Bob and Sabine Schnelle, Johnson City, Tenn.; seven grandchildren; and 13 great-grandchildren.

They moved to Craig, Colo., in August 1959, and he started his 30-year career with Moffat County Schools. He initiated the first elementary physical education program in the early 1960s.

After receiving his master's degree in 1964 from the University of Northern Colorado, he became an administrator and was principal at Sunset Elementary School until he retired in 1989.

Survivors include his wife, Kathryn; two daughters, Kristin and Steve Hentschel, Pagosa Springs, Colo., and Karen, Craig, Colo.; one grandson; a brother, Ben and Deanna, Greeley, Colo.; and three sisters, Tena Wimer, McCook; Marie McChesney, Oberlin; and Lillian Hartford, Helena, Mont.;

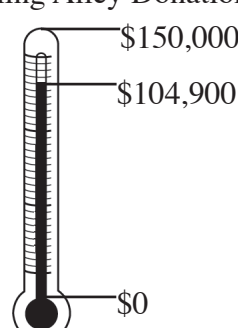
