Paul Henry Strecker

Paul Henry Strecker, 87, father of Pastor Charlotte Strecker-Baseler of Oberlin, died Friday, June 15, 2012, at the Great Bend Regional Hospital.

Of Volga-German descent, he was born Feb. 11, 1925, in rural Russell County, the son of Henry C. Strecker and Caroline Ottelia (Keil) Strecker. He was baptized March 25, 1925, at Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Milberger. He was confirmed on June 19, 1938, at Trinity Lutheran Church in Otis by the Rev. H. Raum and was a member of St. Paul Lutheran Church in Galatia.

He grew up in Galatia, where he attended grade school. He graduated with the Class of 1942 from Hoisington High School and attended business school in Hutchinson. He was drafted into the Army on Feb. 1, 1951, during the Korean War and served two years before he was discharged on Feb. 2, 1953.

He was married to Norma Marie Wahl of Gorham on July 31, 1954, at Trinity Lutheran Church in Hays by the Rev. F. Krauss. The couple lived and farmed on the family farm at Galatia.

He served as deacon, church treasurer and secretary, Sunday School superintendent and treasurer, and choir member for more than 60 years at the church in Galatia; secretary of the Lutheran Men in Mission of Area 2; and was a member of the American Lutheran Church Southwest Kansas Conference

She was born June 14, 1913, in Gove County, the daughter of Robert and Iva (Wright) Russell. She married George H. Burris on June 24, 1940, in Gove County. He died in 1988. She was a member of the Baptist Church and the Wallace Rebekah Lodge.

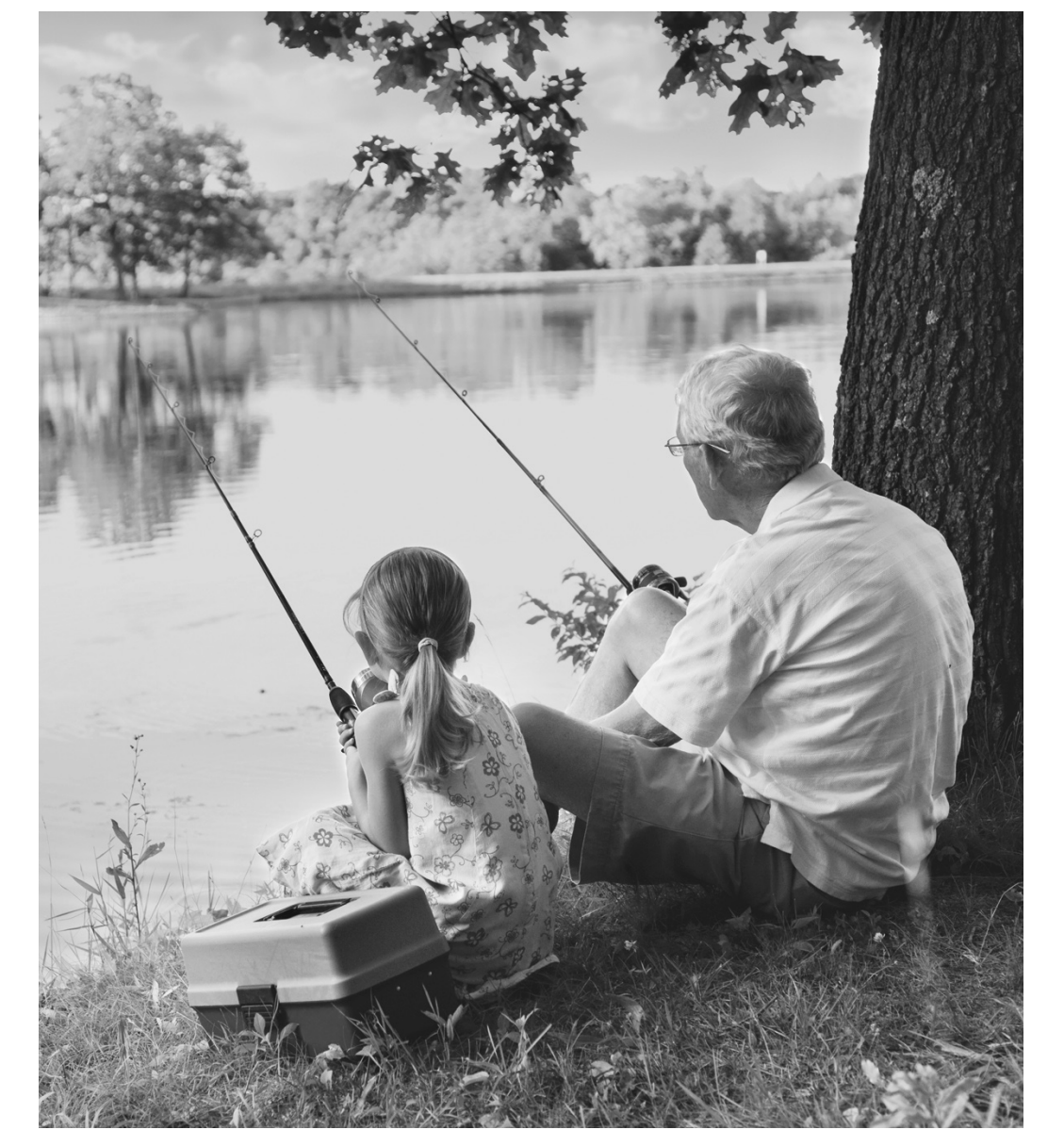

