Alumni Association employees Brad Elund and Kelsey Hill, both Hoxie natives, handed out calendars, stickers and beads and talked about the university.

The School of Businesses is getting a new building across from Allen Field House, Mr. Elund said, and the new Rock Chalk Park in northwest Lawrence will house soccer and softball fields and a track. The university has not been able to hold Big 12 track meets in the past because of its subpar track, he said.

A new building attached to the field house will house an original copy of the rules of basketball given to the university last year, he said. The rules were typewritten by Dr. James Naismith, inventor of the game, in New York. He later became KU's first

The bad news is state budget cuts, which will especially hurt the medical school, he said. The deadline to apply for the grant is September. Mr. Zodrow says he needs to have the surveys accounted for by the end of the July to allow enough time to process the data.

He said the data collected from the survey can also be used for any projects the city might have for the next 10 years.
