## Clocksneed set forward on Sunday

It is time to reset your clocks. Time will be springing forward this weekend, robbing you of an hour of sleep and bringing longer, sunnier evenings.

Daylight saving time officially begins at 2 a.m. on Sunday, March 9. This means that we lose (not clocks ahead an hour to 3 a.m. when our clocks reach 2 a.m. on Sunday.

It is this time change that usually leaves people reaching for the snooze button on the alarm. While it may seem silly to complain about losing just an hour of sleep, there may be some merit to the claim that daylight saving

time affect's a person's body.

Starting four days before, try to go to bed 15 minutes earlier gain) an hour when we turn our each night leading up to the time change, allowing yourself to gradually adjust. By Sunday, the new time change won't affect you, and you will be going to sleep at your "usual" bedtime. If your schedule doesn't allow this, go to sleep and wake up like usual. On Sunday, do not sleep an extra hour to compensate. Wake up as usual.

#### Foundation awards grants totaling almost \$21,000

The St. Francis Community Foundation recently awarded three grants, totaling \$17,700, to community entities.

Receiving \$10,000 was the Good Samaritan Village, to be used for remodeling the west entrance of the facility. The funds were from an anonymous donation in memory of Willard Zweygardt.

The foundation disbursed other grants to the St. Francis Senior Center and the Cheyenne County Hospital. The center received \$6,000 to remodel the kitchen. The hospital received \$1,700 to be used for staff training installing PICC IV lines.

The three grants were from the Senior LivingFund, a fieldof-interest fund within the foundation.
